**MOBILE ARCHITECTURES: BETWEEN SPACE AND EVENT

Movement and migration are pressing themes of contemporary life. Whether driven by political and economic necessity or resulting from a surplus of leisure time, people are more globally mobile than ever before. How might design, architecture and art respond to this relentless fluidity of people, capital, data, ideas and commodity goods?

In TRANS-FoRM-ers, 400 students from The University of Auckland's School of Architecture and Planning, UHITEC, and AUT will compete in teams to design and fabricate "mobile architectures". At 5pm on Friday October 16th, as part of the Architecture Week events, these "mobile architectures" will form Auckland's first ever architecture convoy, moving through Auckland from Western Springs to Grey Lynn, K Rd and Queen St. On their way they will create a public spectacle and rouse the curiosity of the traffic-bound public.

Arriving at 6pm at the former Bus Depot in Shed 12, 91 Wellesley Street West (the Architecture Week venue), these mobile architectures will undergo transformation, revealing an interior, to be exhibited and experienced as part of the Architecture Week Pecha Kucha evening. Under construction at this stage, the projects from The University of Auckland range across experimental materials and super scales, from giant silver vibrating balloons to collapsible cardboard towers. This will be a night to remember.

Watch out for the convoy and come along to this extravagant public architectural event to vote for the winning project. There will be bars and food on site.

Modulorbeat is the German-based practice of Marc Günnewig and Jan Kampschhoff, and is best known for temporary buildings such as the Switch+ information centre, a temporary booth designed for an outdoor sculpture exhibition in Münster in 2007, and Kubik, in which 1000-litre water tanks were used to create a itinerant open air night club.

Japanese architect Shigeru Ban has secured a place among the global architecture elite. His key early projects were a series of innovative houses, many employing unusual structural solutions such as the use of furniture as load-bearing structure, but he came to international prominence with his "paper tube" projects, in which cardboard tubes are used as the structural system. Ban has also been recognised for his work in creating emergency relief shelters. Recent and current projects include housing in the United States and Sri Lanka, and the new Centre Pompidou-Metz in France, due for completion next year.

Chris Kelly is one of New Zealand's highest profile young architects. Working with Renzo Piano Building Workshop in Italy and Japan, he returned to Wellington to establish Architecture Workshop in 1991. Since then he has produced a series of projects acclaimed both locally and internationally - Architecture Workshop's Peregrine Winery (2005) received an NZIA Supreme Award and the AR's ar+d Emerging Architecture award in the UK.
